Description: Research on Lowering Violence in Communities in Schools (ReSOLV) is a California-wide study carried about by the American Institutes for Research (AIR) that examines: 1) The root causes of school violence; 2) The relationships between school safety (physical, social, and emotional), community safety, and student outcomes in rural, urban, and suburban schools in California; and 3) The capacities and commitment of staff, parents, students, schools, and your larger community and how they influence school safety and student outcomes. Findings will help schools and communities better understand the relationship between community, school, and individual capacities and the willingness to adopt a comprehensive school safety approach to address root causes of school violence. Results will inform schools' planning, financing, and evaluation of current and future school safety prevention and intervention efforts.

Description: We seek to understand how race and punishment intersect to provide health disparities in immigrant detention centers, using novel data from the National Immigrant Justice Center. We ask: 1) Given the non-criminal nature of detainee violation, what is life like for the average immigrant detainee in the U.S.?; 2) What are the key characteristics in ICE facilities creating these conditions?; 3) What can immigrant detention centers teach us about health and racial stratification? Our current findings suggest that punitive capacity (sexual assaults, physical assaults, dispersion of chemical weapons, disturbances, use of restraints, and SWAT deployment) predict deaths, attempted suicides, and medical/psychiatric service referrals outside of the facility. We also find that punitive capacity is unrelated to facility standards, access to legal counsel, and detainee grievances.

Description: The NAACP-Legal Defense & Educational Fund, in conjunction with the National Center for Youth Law and Texas Appleseed, filed a complaint with the Office for Civil Rights against the Bryan Independent School District. The complaint suggests that the Bryan ISD's practice of assessing misdemeanor (criminal) tickets to students, particularly ticketing for minor behaviors like disorderly conduct, language infractions, and classroom disruption, has a disparate impact on African American students in the Bryan ISD and violates Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. Our research team is providing qualitative social scientific research that provides a more nuanced assessment of the ways in which school based policing policies within the Bryan ISD have a disparate impact on African American students and further contribute to social stereotypes of criminality among men of color and the unequal distribution of personal safety among students within public schools.
